SUBJECT: Job 040912 FAP NHPP-1724(2) Interstate 40 Sign Upgrades (S) Route 40, Sections 11 & 12 Crawford & Franklin Counties Tier 1 Categorical Exclusion

The project proposes to install and replace 158 Overhead/Ground Mounted main lane signs on Interstate 40 in Crawford and Franklin counties. Additionally, the project would replace the associated regulatory, warning, and interchange ramp signs to provide an Interstate facility that meets current standards. A project location map with sign information is attached.

The project will not involve relocations, prime farmlands, wetlands, underground storage tanks, hazardous materials, any environmental justice issues, or cultural resources. This project has been determined to generate minimal air quality impacts for Clean Air Act criteria pollutants and has not been linked with any special mobile source air toxics concerns. The cultural resources clearance is attached.

The official species lists obtained through the US Fish and Wildlife Service's (USFWS) Information for Planning and Consultation identified the following species as potentially occurring within the project area: Gray Bat (*Myotis grisescens*), Indiana Bat (*Myotis sodalis*), Northern Long-eared Bat (*Myotis septentrionalis*), Ozark Big-eared Bat (*Corynorhinus townsendii ingens*), Tricolored Bat (*Perimyotis subflavus*), Eastern Black Rail (*Laterallus jamaicensis ssp. jamaicensis*), Piping Plover (*Charadrius melodus*), Rufa Red Knot (*Calidris canutus rufa*), Alligator Snapping Turtle (*Macrochelys temminckii*), American Burying Beetle (*Nicrophorus americanus*), Monarch Butterfly (*Danaus plexippus*), and Missouri bladderpod (*Physaria filiformis*). This project will have "no effect" on the aforementioned federally listed species due to the limited scope of the action, lack of suitable habitat, and distance to known species locations. The official species list is attached.

The Alligator Snapping Turtle is currently a proposed threatened species; the Tricolored Bat is a proposed endangered species, and the Monarch Butterfly is a candidate species; however, the proposed project will not jeopardize the continued existence of any of these species.

This project will not have a discharge of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States; therefore, a Section 404 permit will not be required.



- SUBJECT: Cultural Resources Clearance Job 040912 Interstate 40 Sign Upgrades (S) Route 40, Sections 11, 12 Crawford & Franklin Counties

The project proposes to install and replace 158 Overhead/Ground Mounted main lane signs, as well as regulatory, warning, and interchange ramp signs, on Interstate 40, in Crawford and Franklin counties. No new right-of-way (ROW) will be acquired.

Any evidence of past human activities would have been destroyed with the construction of the interstate. If present, there is little potential to impact existing intact archeological sites or historic resources with the replacement and installation of signs in the existing ROW. No new visual elements will be introduced since signs are already present along these roadways. No impacts will occur to historic properties present near these corridors.

Records check of previous sites and structures, historic maps, and aerial imagery were not done based on the limited scope of the project. This project has no potential to impact existing archeological or historic resources due to previous interstate construction. All work will be within the existing ROW, and the limited scope of the project occurs within previously disturbed areas. This type of undertaking will not affect historic properties. Therefore, this project requires no Section 106 review under Appendix C, Activity 28, of the 2021 Programmatic Agreement.

The species list fulfills the requirements of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) under section 7(c) of the Endangered Species Act (Act) of 1973, as amended (16 U.S.C. 1531 *et seq.*).

New information based on updated surveys, changes in the abundance and distribution of species, changed habitat conditions, or other factors could change this list. Please feel free to contact us if you need more current information or assistance regarding the potential impacts to federally proposed, listed, and candidate species and federally designated and proposed critical habitat. Please note that under 50 CFR 402.12(e) of the regulations implementing section 7 of the Act, the accuracy of this species list should be verified after 90 days. This verification can be completed formally or informally as desired. The Service recommends that verification be completed by visiting the IPaC website at regular intervals during project planning and implementation for updates to species lists and information. An updated list may be requested through the IPaC system by completing the same process used to receive the enclosed list.

The purpose of the Act is to provide a means whereby threatened and endangered species and the ecosystems upon which they depend may be conserved. Under sections 7(a)(1) and 7(a)(2) of the Act and its implementing regulations (50 CFR 402 *et seq.*), Federal agencies are required to utilize their authorities to carry out programs for the conservation of threatened and endangered species and to determine whether projects may affect threatened and endangered species and/or designated critical habitat.

A Biological Assessment is required for construction projects (or other undertakings having similar physical impacts) that are major Federal actions significantly affecting the quality of the human environment as defined in the National Environmental Policy Act (42 U.S.C. 4332(2) (c)). For projects other than major construction activities, the Service suggests that a biological

evaluation similar to a Biological Assessment be prepared to determine whether the project may affect listed or proposed species and/or designated or proposed critical habitat. Recommended contents of a Biological Assessment are described at 50 CFR 402.12.

If a Federal agency determines, based on the Biological Assessment or biological evaluation, that listed species and/or designated critical habitat may be affected by the proposed project, the agency is required to consult with the Service pursuant to 50 CFR 402. In addition, the Service recommends that candidate species, proposed species and proposed critical habitat be addressed within the consultation. **Migratory Birds**: In addition to responsibilities to protect threatened and endangered species under the Endangered Species Act (ESA), there are additional responsibilities under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA) and the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act (BGEPA) to protect native birds from project-related impacts. Any activity, intentional or unintentional, resulting in take of migratory birds, including eagles, is prohibited unless otherwise permitted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (50 C.F.R.
