Pulaski County

Tier 1 Categorical Exclusion

This project proposes to address the deteriorating road conditions on approximately 3.3 miles of Interstates 30 and 630 utilizing mill and overlay, UTBWC, concrete patching, and rumble strips including ramps and bridges in Pulaski County. A project location map is attached.

The project will not involve relocations, prime farmlands, wetlands, underground storage tanks, hazardous materials, any environmental justice issues, or cultural resources. This project has been determined to generate minimal air quality impacts for Clean Air Act criteria pollutants and has not been linked with any special mobile source air toxics concerns. The cultural resources clearance is attached.

The official species lists obtained through the US Fish and Wildlife Service's Information for Planning and Consultation identified the following species as potentially occurring within the project area: Northern Long-eared Bat (*Myotis setpentrionalis*), Tricolored Bat (*Perimyotis subflavus*), Eastern Black Rail (*Laterallus jamaicensis ssp. jamaicensis*), Piping Plover (*Charadrius melodus*), Red Knot (*Calidris canutus rufa*), Alligator Snapping Turtle (*Macrochelys temminckii*), and Monarch butterfly (*Danaus plexippus*). The official species list is attached. This project will have "no effect" on the aforementioned species due to the limited scope of the action, lack of suitable habitat, and distance to known species locations.

The Alligator Snapping Turtle is currently a proposed threatened species; the Tricolored Bat is a proposed endangered species, and the Monarch butterfly is a candidate species; however, the proposed project will not jeopardize the continued existence of these species.

This project will not have a discharge of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States; therefore, a Section 404 permit will not be required.



South Terminal – I-630 (S) Route 30, Section 23 Route 630, Section 21

Pulaski County

This job proposes 3.27 miles of mill and overlay, UTBWC, concrete patching, rumble strips, and replacing approach gutters and guardrails for various interstate bridges on a portion of Interstates 30 and 630 (I-30 and I-630) in Pulaski County. All work will occur within the existing right-of-way (ROW).

Previous records review and survey work for this area were conducted under job CA0602 that involved widening I-30 from Interstate 530 to Interstate 40 (I-40) in Little Rock and North Little Rock. Currently under construction, job CA0602 now only includes widening I-30, north of I-630 to I-40, and excluded widening this section of I-30. Therefore, the current job 061820 does not operate under the *CA0602 Programmatic Agreement*.

The previous records review and survey noted nearby sites, structures, cemeteries, and historic districts. None of which will be affected by this undertaking since the project is confined maintenance of the existing roadway and bridges.

Bridges A3179, 03179, 05699, B3335, A3335, A3395, B3395, A3397, 03332, B5700, 05698, A5700, D5700, and X0203 are found not eligible for inclusion in the NRHP under the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation's Section 106 exemption regarding effects to the Interstate Highway System (f70 FR 11928).

Bridges A2623 and B2623 are found not eligible as the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation's Program Comment on post-1945 concrete and steel bridges (77 FR 68790) applies. Bridges C3397, F5700, C5700, 05992, 05994, 05993, and 05482 are less than 45 years old. Work is confined to the existing guardrail and approaches of these bridges.

The highway infrastructure, available plans, and known construction practices were examined to assess previous ground disturbance. All work will take place on the existing roadway in previously disturbed areas within the existing ROW. No historic properties will be affected as a result of this undertaking. Therefore, this project requires no Section 106 review under Appendix C, Activity 1, of the 2021 Programmatic Agreement.

The species list fulfills the requirements of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) under section 7(c) of the Endangered Species Act (Act) of 1973, as amended (16 U.S.C. 1531 *et seq.*).

New information based on updated surveys, changes in the abundance and distribution of species, changed habitat conditions, or other factors could change this list. Please feel free to contact us if you need more current information or assistance regarding the potential impacts to federally proposed, listed, and candidate species and federally designated and proposed critical habitat. Please note that under 50 CFR 402.12(e) of the regulations implementing section 7 of the Act, the accuracy of this species list should be verified after 90 days. This verification can be completed formally or informally as desired. The Service recommends that verification be completed by visiting the ECOS-IPaC website at regular intervals during project planning and implementation for updates to species lists and information. An updated list may be requested through the ECOS-IPaC system by completing the same process used to receive the enclosed list.

The purpose of the Act is to provide a means whereby threatened and endangered species and the ecosystems upon which they depend may be conserved. Under sections 7(a)(1) and 7(a)(2) of the Act and its implementing regulations (50 CFR 402 *et seq.*), Federal agencies are required to utilize their authorities to carry out programs for the conservation of threatened and endangered species and to determine whether projects may affect threatened and endangered species and/or designated critical habitat.

A Biological Assessment is required for construction projects (or other undertakings having similar physical impacts) that are major Federal actions significantly affecting the quality of the human environment as defined in the National Environmental Policy Act (42 U.S.C. 4332(2) (c)). For projects other than major construction activities, the Service suggests that a biological

evaluation similar to a Biological Assessment be prepared to determine whether the project may affect listed or proposed species and/or designated or proposed critical habitat. Recommended contents of a Biological Assessment are described at 50 CFR 402.12.

If a Federal agency determines, based on the Biological Assessment or biological evaluation, that listed species and/or designated critical habitat may be affected by the proposed project, the agency is required to consult with the Service pursuant to 50 CFR 402. In addition, the Service recommends that candidate species, proposed species and proposed critical habitat be addressed within the consultation. Migratory Birds: In addition to responsibilities to protect threatened and endangered species under the Endangered Species Act (ESA), there are additional responsibilities under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA) and the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act (BGEPA) to protect native birds from project-related impacts. Any activity, intentional or unintentional, resulting in take of migratory birds, including eagles, is prohibited unless otherwise permitted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (50 C.F.R. The MBTA has no provision for allowing take of migratory birds that may be unintentionally killed or injured by otherwise lawful activities.
