

NEW HEADQUARTERS UNVEILED AT PARAGOULD

Thursday October 6 was a red letter day in Paragould for the Highway Department's District 10 when the new \$750,000 headquarters building was unveiled to the public in dedication ceremonies and an open house.

Approximately 500 persons attended the event and toured the new complex during open house. Officials and Department employees were on hand to act as guides through the maze of buildings and explain the various operations necessary to keep District 10 employees and machinery on the move in Northeast Arkansas.

Highway Commissioner Maurice Smith of Birdeye delivered the dedicatory address and unveiled the plaque outside the front entrance to the administration building. Alvin B. Samuels, Jr., president of the Paragould Chamber of Commerce, was master of ceremonies. The welcoming addresses were given by Paragould Mayor J. T. "Chigger" Brown, and Greene County Judge J. P. Reed.

Highway Director Walter E. Hicks and several other Department heads from Little Rock and District 1 attended the ceremonies.


The new facilities are the most up-to-date in the state and an identical building is under construction at Camden's District 7 headquarters.

The complex consists of five buildings — administration, chemical, resident engineer, service station, and equipment storage, covering a 40,000 square foot, or one acre area. There are approximately five acres of asphalt pavement inside the compound for use as driveways and parking.

Punch and cookies were prepared and served by Mrs. M.S. Smith, Mrs. John Saunders, and Mrs. Darrell Holder. H. C. Martin, resident engineer, furnished some of his prize miniature plants for decorations. A steak dinner was given that night in the huge garage of the complex.

Highway Commission Chairman Wayne Hampton October 5 appointed John R. Thompson, 63, as general counsel for the Highway Department. Mr. Thompson fills the position left vacant several months ago by Mark Woolsey when Woolsey became chairman of the Workmen's Compensation Commission. Highway Commissioner Truman Baker was also present when the announcement was made.

Thompson resigned October 4 as a member the Public Service Commission to accept the general counsel's position. He had been a member of the Public Service Commission since 1949 with the exception of two years during which he served as assistant chief attorney general.

The new counsel's explanation for the shift was, "It is a promotion; there are more responsibilities; it is a bigger department, and it offers a challenge."

A native of Austin in Lonoke County, Thompson has a long record of public service serving in the administration of Gov. Carl Bailey. Aside from his tenures with the PSC and attorney general's office, he served as director of the state welfare for three years, was attorney for the Public Service Commission two years, and was city prosecutor for two years.

Thompson's formal education was rather sketchy during his early life. He attended an academy for underpriviliged children at Magazine, Ark., then graduated from Austin High School and later Little Rock Law School.

Thompson is married to the former Miss Marie Beasley. They have a son, Edgar Ross, an attorney with his father in their law firm, Thompson and ompson, and three granddaughters.

Thompson is a Sunday school teacher at the Austin Baptist Church and is a 32nd Degree Mason.

BE KIND TO THE FARKLEBERRY TREE



The poor Farkleberry tree has been in the news again recently after a lull of a couple of years.

The tree has been the brunt of many snide cracks, apparently only because of its name, and it seems that there are many who doubt that the tree exists.

If we're not mistaken, it was through the pages of this magazine that the publicity about the Farkleberry first appeared. In February 1963, R.B. Winfrey, then Maintenance engineer and now retired, brought a picture of the tree to be printed with the information that the tree was the largest in the United States. This statistic was supplied by Mr. Kendall Laughlin of Chicago in a letter to Mr. Winfrey. Mr. Kendall said the tree was larger than the tree shown in the last published list by the American Forestry Association.

So, lest any of you are non-believers, "Yes, Virginia, there is a Farkleberry Tree." The one shown is the Granddaddy of them all. It is located in Pike County near Glenwood. When the picture was first printed, it was 5 inches in diameter, had a circumference of 1'3", a height of 20 feet, and a spread of 14 feet. We're sure the tree has grown since that time but we have no current measurements.

There are a number of Farkleberry trees (vaccinum arboreum) in Arkansas. Its botanical name is the genus of the blueberry and cranberry. It is our understanding that another large tree exists in North Little Rock. Mr. Laughlin stated in his lette to Mr. Winfrey that caution should be taken to prevent sightseers or vandals from molesting the trees.

If any of our readers have any intention of making Farkleberry jelly, better forget it unless you have plenty of time on your hands. You'll need it as the fruit of the Farkleberry tree is hard as concrete and cooking time would be somewhat more than the usual "boil 10 minutes."

It's bad enough to move household furniture and other effects from one house to another, but to move the contents of a four-story office building, plus contents of other outpouring buildings that make up the Highway Department on the Capitol Mall should be quite an interesting undertaking.

By contents we would list desks, filing cabinets, chairs to match the desks and quite a number of extras, tables, office machines, drafting and engineering equipment and so many other items it would be impossible to list them. But, they are the smaller objects. Consider the fact that the larger equipment, which includes IBM machines, computers, cameras, reproduction paraphernalia etc., all must be moved, too. And that's something to consider.

But, the business of life is to go forward and, if in the process, it causes a bit of inconvenience, it will be well worth it. The new Highway Building, located just off the New Benton Highway, is ready for occupancy and we should all be ensconced in our new 10-story edifice in a few weeks.

Our "new" old Highway Building on the Capitol Mall has long been obsolete to suit our ever-growing needs. Built in 1939, it was considered at the time to be more than adequate. Prior to moving into it, the operation of the Department was being carried on in the wooden structure "up on the hill," or in back of the administration building. The old structure has been in use by the Right of Way Division.

Through the years the growth of the Department became so crucial that it necessitated several divisions to literally move out of the building into other housing on a rental basis. This was not only an expense but an inconvenience for most concerned. For a while the Department was scattered about in such various areas it was difficult to keep track.

The new building is designed to accommodate all the divisions nowhoused in the present building and those in the older buildings "up on the hill." District 6, Materials and Tests, and Planning and Research have been located at the new compound for several years. Each has its own building with the exception of Planning and Research which shares part of its building with Weights and Standards.

So, what was only a nebulous vision 10 years ago has now become a reality and, when the building is all ready for occupancy, the hegira will begin.

The building directory will be as follows: TENTH FLOOR: Commission Conference Room; Office of the Director; Office of Chief Engineer; Office of Assistant Chief Engineer (Moore); Office of Assistant to the Chief Engineer; Office of Administrative Assistant; Internal Audit Section; Safet, Section; Magazine Section; Public Relations Section.

NINTH FLOOR: Office of Office Engineer; Construction Division; Office of Assistant Chief Engineer (Pendergrass); Final Estimates Section.

EIGHTH FLOOR: Right of Way; Legal.
SEVENTH FLOOR: Right of Way Division.
SIXTH FLOOR: Surveys Division; Roadway
Design Division

FIFTH FLOOR: County Roads; Bridge Design Division; Procurement Section.

FOURTH FLOOR: Accounting Division; Photogrammetry Section; Weigh's and Standards Division.


THIRD FLOOR: Equipment Division; Data Processing Section.

SECOND FLOOR: Beautification Section; Road Plans Storage; Reproduction Section; Microfilming Section.

FIRST FLOOR: Lobby and Information Desk; Maintenance Division; Personnel Section; Commission Hearing Room.

BASEMENT: Radio Section; Stationery and Supply Room; Dining Room and Kitchen; Permit Section (tentatively); Photography Laboratory Decontamination Room*.




