### WHAT MAKES A MAGAZINE ---

The candid truth of what really makes a magazine can be expressed in two words, "the reader." Not that there isn't more to the actual publication than that -- still and all, without you, the reader, there would be no justification for the magazine's existence. Most organizational publications have a purpose, and your "Arkansas Highways" is no exception to that rule. The main purpose of your magazine is to bring about a better understanding between the employees and the Commission, a better understanding of the various functions of the Department and the accomplishments which it hopes to attain.

You may ask yourself. "Why? Why should anyone care whether or not I understand what the Commission is doing -- or the other Divisions. for that matter?" The answer is very simple: Not just "anyone" but many people are interested in you as an individual because you are important to the Department. It is scarcely believable how little the average employee of a large organization such as ours knows of the work being done in the next Division or section. Often an employee does not see clearly the manner in which his own job fits into the

work pattern of the Department as a whole. By giving you information regarding the work being done by the other employees and your Con mission, you may have a better conception of your own work and the vital contribution it makes to the Department's success.

As an employee of the Arkansas Highway Department; regardless of which job you hold, you are in reality more than just an employee, Consider this: "Who are our employers?" The public, of course. "And who is the public?" As an Arkansas citizen, aren't you part of the public? Certainly, you are So, that makes you a "Boss" doesn it? We of the Highway Department hold the interesting position being both employer and employee Thus, we cannot put ourselves in one class or another for warring purposes without hurting ourselves So the truth of the matter is that our best interests lie in what! best for all. The Commission are our Highway Officials know thi and want you to know it so tha by mutual understanding of th various problems to be overcome w can all pull together to achiev our common goal: maximum efficienc within a minimum of time.

Your "Arkansas Highways" magazine made its initial appearance in November 1953. There have been many problems to work out and obstacles to overcome, which is only to be expected with any new enterprise. We have tried to improve with each issue of the magazine and hope to improve even more in the future. The format (general akeup and layout) of the magazine the same as that of our first issue and will continue to remain the same. So far, the improvements have consisted of better typewriters, stencils, paper and, with the June issue, colored stock for the covers. We plan to use pictures and a better grade of paper for the body of the magazine beginning with our September issue.

News-Magazine

Ours is not a newspaper, house organ, bulletin, or a technical bublication. It is best defined as a News-Magazine, because we not only carry news of the Highway Department but we also carry informational articles as well as personals of the employees and their activities. We cannot carry spot news in a monthly magazine, however, this disadvantage is not serious since magazines, as a rule, are taken home to be read at one's leisure and are often kept for rereading. This type of publication was chosen not only because it is

by and for the employees of the Arkansas Highway Department, but also because ours is a very large organization. There are over 2,700 employees on our payrolls today who receive each issue of the "Arkansas Highways." The magazine is also sent to all retired members of the Department, employees on leaves of absence, and many others whose requests for the magazine have warranted placing their names on our mailing list. Unfortunately, we cannot fulfill all requests as our mailing list would soon become prohibitive.

A great deal of time and effort goes into the preparation of each issue of your "Arkansas Highways" magazine. So far, it has been necessary to have a flexible deadline because we could not foresee a delay until the difficulty occurred. It is our intention to set a definite date for the issuance of future magazines just as soon as we have mastered the majority of our problems and can meet such a deadline date.

### Preparing Copy

In preparing a magazine of this type, a "Dummy" is first made up signifying the articles, news items etc., to be used for the particular issue, and the number of pages, columns or lines to be used on each page. Space will not permit the usage of long articles, so when

these articles are received they must be rewritten and condensed to fit into the allotted space. However, it is a much simpler process to condense an article than it is to try and enlarge one, when no extra information is given to help fill the assignment. In this case, research must be undertaken so that all additional information will be accurate.

Unlike the preparation of copy which goes to commercial printers where the mechanics are done by the linotype or monotype operator and compositor, copy can seldom be used in our magazine with the exact wording in which it was originally written. The entire magazine is prepared for stencil usage and the body typed on manual typewriters without the aid of a justifier, consequently, the mechanics of each issue are timeconsuming in that all word characters must be counted. Some words will not split for carryover to the next line, therefore the words of that sentence, and sometimes an entire paragraph, must be rearranged or rewritten in order to conform to column requirements.

Good magazine style does not allow margin for "widows" (a single short word or half a word on a line by itself) or for words to be split for a carryover of a suffix of only two characters such as: "ed," "er," "en," "ly," "ty," etc. Too, "rivers" (the spacing between words which happen to fall one under another in such a manner as to make a seemingly white river down through the type on a page) are to be avoided. In some instances, it is necessary, in order to eliminate rewriting several sentences, to delete conjunctions, adjectives or definite articles where their ommission is clearly understood and does not detract from the meaning intended.

### Final Layout

After the writing to be used in the magazine has been arranged in even columns, the lines are counted and then adjusted to fit into the pages. They must be cut or filled as the case may be. Nothing ever "just happens" to fall into an allotted space, it must be made to do so in order to maintain balance. Each page is planned logically for reader interest and treated as a separate and important problem to avoid the monotony usually attributed to magazines where pictures are not used for "breaks."

The pages are assembled, properly paired, and pasted on 8½ by 14 layout sheets, which are marked in detail for final typing and used as master sheets. Each layout sheet carries paste-ups on both sides for ready reference in correctly backing up the pages during the process of mimeographing. When all sheets have been printed, they

are gathered in sequence so that each folio will follow in numerical order when folded. After this process has been completed, they are stapled and become your individual magazines ready for delivery.

### Mutual Concept

It is only human for any person to want to be proud of his job, the organization for which he works. and to be loyal to his supervisors. He also wants to know where his organization is going and just what it's course will mean to him personally. Your Commission and Highway Officials appreciate this because that is exactly the way they feel about it, too. So, by using your magazine as spokesman. they wish to take you into their confidence by explaining objectives, problems, and interpreting policies, simply, fully, and reasonably, so that you may understand their side of the picture. Thus. when you know why certain steps are taken, certain rules and regulations are set forth, you have a concrete example of what is expected of you, and why.

Cooperation, however, is a fifty-fifty proposition, and if you fail to respond by explaining your side of the picture the whole theory disintegrates. Through the medium of your "Arkansas Highways" magazine, you have the opportunity of offering suggestions on new ways to

increase productive efficiency, as well as expressing your views and opinions regarding the policies which have been inaugurated. Most of these policies have been put into effect in order to afford more favorable working conditions for you, so that your work capacity may reach the maximum.

If you have just cause for complaint, don't grumble where it will do no good. Instead, let thepeople who can change this condition know of it either through your magazine or Employees' Advisory Committee. Rest assured that it will receive serious consideration. If you are pleased with the present set-up, let that be known, too. The people who made these things possible will appreciate knowing that their efforts in your behalf are justified.

By mutual understanding and cooperation, and pulling together as
one team, we will achieve results
beyond our most imaginative dreams.
It behooves each of us to keep uppermost in our minds that what
hurts the Department hurts us, and
by striving to give our best at all
times we not only protect the Department but we protect ourselves,
our paychecks, and our security.

Your news and views are needed as contributions to the "Arkansas Highways." Since "you" make our magazine, without your assistance it will surely die. Let's keep our magazine not only going, but "glowing" with our enthusiasm.

### NEW ACCOUNTING DIVISION CREATED

The Federal Aid Division, Accounting Division, and Fuel and Inventory Section of the Maintenance Division were merged for administrative purposes July 1, and will be known as the Accounting Division. J. R. Henderson, has been appointed Director of Accounting and will be directly responsible for the administrative supervision of our new Accounting Division.

Mr. Henderson is well-qualified for the position he now holds and has, in a sense, "grown up" with the Highway Department. During his 27 years with the Department, he has served as Rodman, Instrumentman, Resident Engineer, Location Engineer, Federal Aid Auditor, Senior Statistician, Economist, Assistant Statistics and Analyses Engineer. and, of course, Federal Aid Engineer, the position he held prior to his new appointment. He is a professional engineer, registered with the Arkansas State Board for Professional Engineers.

Mr. Henderson informed us, with a big grin on his face during a recent interview, that he took a part-time job with the Department in 1927, and has been working at it ever since. "I got my engineering the hard way," he divulged, "by correspondence courses, home work, and a deep-rooted interest in the subject."

He disclosed that the Commission has given him a year to study and view all operations, during which time plans will be made to develop a modern accounting system that will result in an economy of time and create greater efficiency.

"The work of all three depart ments is similar," Mr. Henderson explained, "and will be geared together in an even closer relationship by the end of the year. A survey will be made of the whole fiscal set-up, which will probably require the assistance of outside experts. We have grown much like 'Topsy' over the years, and while some changes have been made of the Accounting System, there has been no major overhaul. By viewing the entire situation from all angles thoroughly studying the present procedures, and taking consideration of all new methods, we feel that a modern system can be established which will more than compensate for any expense involved."

Mr. Henderson is making plans on a long-range scale so that no innovation will become obsolete before maximum usage has been obtained. This seems to us to be very clear thinking. We join his many friends in congratulating him on his appointment and in wishing him the greatest success as our Director of Accounting.

# PINE BLUFF ORIGIN-DESTINATION STUDY

An origin and destination survey began operations July 12 at all primary points of entry to the Pine Bluff urban area and will continue operations until July 28. This survey is being conducted by the traffic engineering staff of the Statistics and Analyses Division of our Highway Department, with local Pine Bluff assistance.

This origin-destination survey is being made to provide a guide for long-range planning of the streets and highways in and around the Pine Bluff area. By obtaining direct information from the people on where they are going, and where they are coming from, a pattern is formed, from which sound estimates can be derived on the future needs

n streets and highways.

Statutory authority gives the cities of Arkansas planning jurisdiction for a distance of 5 miles beyond their corporate limits. which enables them to protect the rights-of-way for a system of major streets and highways. The everincreasing traffic volume has congested our urban centers to such an extent that there is a critical need for long-range planning and study. Only in this manner can we assure that the streets and highways we are building today will be protected for future expansion as the needs arise.

An interview station is set up each day at one or two points of entry to the Pine Bluff area, and is operated for an 8-hour period. During the first half of the field survey, the stations are operated between the hours of 6 a.m. and 2 p.m., and during the second half, between 2 p.m. and 10 p.m.

The inbound traffic through a station is lane-bound by yellow and black striped rubber cones along the center line of the pavement, with the interviewers standing between the cones wearing yellow sun helmets with the letters AHD prominently displayed in black.

Advance publicity was given to inform the citizens of Pine Bluff and their out-of-State guests of the purpose of the study to avoid confusion and delay. Some of the at the interviewing activities stations have been Televised which helped acquaint the public with

the interviewing procedure.

Cecil S. Lynch, Vice Chairman of the Highway Commission, spoke to the people of Pine Bluff Television. He explained the need of the survey, its purpose, and what its outcome can mean as an investment in the future. Lynch asked for the cooperation of everyone so that the desired information could be obtained in the briefest rossible time.

# E.S. DUDLEY SUCCUMBS

Edward Saylor Dudley, 70, Purchasing Agent and Assistant Director of Equipment and Procurement, died of a heart attack July 29 in

a Little Rock hospital.

Mr. Dudley was born in Columbus, Ohio, but made his home in Arkansas at an early age. He had served the Department since March 1949, and endeared himself to all who knew him. He was a big man with a big heart, always kind and generous.

His work with our Department is best expressed in Highway Director Eldridge's own words, "While I had known Mr. Dudley only a short time, I had the greatest admiration and respect for him. It will be difficult to replace him as he was a man who certainly knew his business and he was doing an excellent job for us, He was as loyal and faithful as a person can be and we will surely miss him."

Prior to his service with the Department, he had acquired vast experience in the administrative, managerial, sales, purchasing, and auditing fields. He was a member of the Methodist Church and life member of the Lafayette Masonic Lodge. His was a capable and active mind, and his ready wit and thoughtful consideration of others won him innumerable friends. It can truly be said of him, "Well done, thy good and faithful servant."

Mr. Dudley is survived by his wife, Mrs. Helen Faust Dudley; two stepsons, F.C. Kyte and R.E. Kyte; a daughter, Mrs. John L. Peters; a brother, R.L. Dudley; two sisters, Mrs. E. T. Bjorn and Miss Carrie Dudley; and three grandchildren. Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church in Little Rock with burial at Pine Crest Memorial Park. Our Highway Commission were honorary pallbearers.


