

A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

SAFETY -A MAJOR FACTOR

Summertime is the prime highway construction time. It also is the prime travel time. This summer will be no exception. In fact, it promises to be a record year for travel in Arkansas. The State's Sesquicentennial celebration will draw tourists to special events scheduled throughout Arkansas.

With over \$420 million worth of highway construction work underway throughout the State, it is almost certain that many motorists this summer will encounter some delays, Along with those delays, comes frustration which often leads to inattention. These factors combine to create unsafe driving habits which can lead to accidents.

Highway and Transportation Department employees working in construction and maintenance zones are well aware of the dangers that can occur in these situtations. That is why it is extremely important

to keep safe driving and working habits in mind at all times. In May, I attended the National Forum on Work Zone Safety, co-sponsored by the American Road and Transportation Builders Association, American Association of State Highway and

Transportation Officials and the Federal Highway Administration. The critical issue of construction/maintenance worker and motorist safety, as well as an evaluation of current practices,

was addressed.

This subject is particularly important at this time as the level of rehabilitation and reconstruction work continues to grow nationwide. The Road and Transportation Builders Association is to be commended for being the leader in bringing together a broad-based group to discuss this important issue. I am confident that in the months to come, more progress will be made in this very important area of concern.

Summertime is also the time which most of our employees take time off for the family vacations. As you travel this summer, keep in mind the safe driving techniques you have learned over the years.

One very important habit is to use your safety belt. Study after study has shown that safety belts work. One such study revealed that an unbelted person is five times more likely to die in an accident than the belted person sitting next to him when a crash occurs. He is three times more likely to be injured and will pay four times more for medical care.

It pays to be safety conscious, whether at work or \mathbf{q} leisure time. If we keep that in mind,

we will all benefit.

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Interstate System Celebrates 30th Anniversary 1956 - 1986

The Interstate System, called by many as "the world's most ambitious civil works program," celebrates its 30th birthday in June.

Many years have passed since studies were undertaken in 1938 to investigate the feasibility of building superhighways. These 1938 studies also included studying the feasibility of a toll system on such superhighways Congress found the idea of toll roads to be unfeasible because of the fluctuation in use and revenue across the country, but the concept of a great trunkline superhighway system was found eminently desirable and a briefly outlined 26,700-mile master plan for free highway development was set out.

In April 1941, President Franklin Roosevelt appointed a National Interregional Highways Committee to investigate the need for a limited system of national highways to improve the facilities available for interregional transportation.

In July 1943, the 78th Congress amended the Defense Highway Act of 1941 to direct the Commissioner of Public Roads "to make a survey of the

need for a system of express highways throughout the United States."

In 1944 Congress established a National System of Interstate Highways. This original Interstate program, as described by the Federal Aid Highway Act called for a national system of Interstate highways "not exceeding 40,000 miles in total extent so located as to connect routes, as direct as practicable, the principal metropolitan areas, cities, industrial centers, to serve the national defense, and to connect at suitable border points with routes of continental importance in the Dominion of Canada and the Republic of Mexico." The idea grew during the next ten years, and became a reality with the passage of the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1956, which authorized use of federal road user taxes to fund the system, thus our modern-day Interstate System was born when Dwight Eisenhower signed the law to fund America's Interstate System on June 29, 1956.


Arkansas constructed its first project using Interstate System Funds in December 1956. The

project entailed adding lanes to Interstate 30 from Little Rock to the Saline County Line. Arkansas has several highways that were built and designated as Interstate highways prior to the passage of the Federal Aid Highway Act. These highways had not been funded with the federal road user taxes but were recognized as part of the Interstate System.

Today, over 90 percent of American cities with populations over 50,000 are linked by the Interstate System. Interstate mileage in the United States covers in excess of 42,000 miles, with the Arkansas Interstate highways contributing 542 miles of this total. The Interstate System constitutes about one percent of America's road mileage, and carries roughly 20 percent of the U.S. traffic. In Arkansas, the Interstate highways make up three percent of the total road mileage while carrying 23 percent of the Arkansas traffic.

Interstate highways are built to handle traffic over a 20-year life cycle. Due to aging of the system, about 2,000 route miles are reaching the repair stage each year. When major repair is needed, 90 percent of the resurfacing, restoration, rehabilitation, and reconstruction costs are paid from the Highway Trust Fund. Trust Fund revenues are derived from highway user taxes, mainly the tax per gallon on gasoline.

The Interstate System has played a vital role in helping Arkansas become a more productive and economically prosperous state. Without the Interstate System in Arkansas the state's farmer and industries would most certainly be in poor condition. We must, therefore, be sure as taxpayers that this Interstate System is maintained. Our investment in the Interstate System must be protected to assure Arkansas as chance to grow in productivity and to assure the people that Arkansas will have a capable transportation network to meet their changing future needs.

Crossing the Mississippi –

the Task Began 100 Years Ago!

Construction on the Interstate Highway System began 30 years ago, and today much of that system is worn out and in need of rehabilitation. Projects to repair and restore our Interstates have been going on for several years in Arkansas. One such project is the rehabilitation of the I-55 Mississippi River Bridge between West Memphis, Arkansas and Memphis, Tennessee.

The \$5.6 million contract provides for painting, deck overlay, and other modifications. It is the first major work on the structure since it was opened to traffic a little over 36 years ago.

The I-55 Bridge is one of two modern interstate highway structures crossing the Mississippi River at West Memphis. The I-40 Bridge has been opened since August 2, 1973.

Although a modern highway crossing of the Mississippi River is now taken for granted, it wasn't until December 17, 1949 that the automobile had a bridge it could call its own. That was when the-then designated Highway 70 Bridge opened to traffic. When the Interstate Highway System came into being in the mid-1950's, the Highway 70 Bridge was redesignated the I-55 Bridge and became the first structure on the interstate system in Arkansas.

It has been 100 years since the task began to build the first bridge over the Mississippi River at Memphis. On January 15, 1886, George S. Morrison, a bridge designer and builder, climbed up the bluff on the Memphis side of the river to select the location for a railroad bridge. He fixed the line by the top of a

staircase on the Memphis side and by a log cabin in the bottom land on the Arkansas side.

At that time the construction of such a bridge was a novel and a major undertaking, and a matter of great professional interest among engineers the world over. This bridge was to be the first crossing of the lower Mississippi; that is, below the confluence of the river with the Ohio at Cario, Illinois, and was in fact the only one below the Eads Bridge at St. Louis. It was to be built for a railroad then known at the Kansas City, Ft. Scott and Memphis system.

The Act of Congress, which granted a charter for the construction of the first bridge, carried a requirement that provision be made for passage of railway trains, wagons, vehicles of all kinds, pedestrians, and for the passage of animals also. The bridge was completed in the early 1890's.

The second bridge on the lower Mississippi was also built at Memphis. This was the Harahan, constructed 200 feet upstream from, and parallel to, the first bridge. Completed in 1916, the Harahan carried a double railway track and two separate 14-foot highway lanes, or wagon-ways as they were called in those days. These lanes, one on each side of the bridge, were carried on cantilevered brackets alongside the trusses and approach towers.

Traffic on the bridge had increased to 11,000 vehicles per day by 1939. The two separated highway lanes, which did not permit passing, were unable to handle this volume adequately, especially when slow moving and stalled vehicles restricted traffic. It therefore became necessary to provide a modern highway crossing, designated solely for highway purposes.

Prominent citizens of Tennessee and Arkansas sponsored and formed the Memphis and Arkansas Bridge Commission in 1939. The Commission secured the cooperation of the highway departments of both states and the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads.

A study conducted by the agencies proposed investigations be made at two locations and a consulting engineering firm, Modjeski and Masters of Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, recommended a site adjacent to the other two bridges already in place.

On July 18, 1945, bids were received for the first two contracts. These bids were considerably higher han the original estimates. It was therefore decided or reject the bids for the Arkansas Approach Substructure and accept the bids on the Main Bridge Substructure in order to not delay final completion.

The Arkansas Approach Substructure was readvertised and bids were again over estimates. The contract was re-negotiated with the low bidder on November 26, 1946 and modified by supplemental agreement. Bids on the remaining projects were received through 1948, bringing the total cost of the bridge and approaches to \$10.4 million.

Although some minor approach work and other items had not been completed, it was decided to open the bridge to traffic on December 17, 1949, ten years after the formation of the Bridge Commission and eight years after the start of active engineering work.

The I-55 Bridge served as the only highway crossing between Arkansas and Tennessee for 24 years until the I-40 Bridge was completed. The I-40 Bridge has greatly relieved the traffic congestion on the Interstate System in the West Memphis area. Today it carries an average of 30,800 vehicles per day. The I-55 Bridge is carrying an average of 26,500 vehicles per day, more than twice the number it carried when it opened.

Early Travel In Arkansas

For most Arkansans trekking across the 16,113 miles of the State Highway System or traversing the 66,531 miles of local roads, not a single thought is given to the origin of those engineering marvels.

In this celebration of 150 years of Arkansas' state-of-being, it is appropriate to reflect on the development of our highway, road, and street system. A crude, inefficient network of Indian trails has evolved into well-designed modern thoroughfares that handle 45.7 million vehicle miles of travel daily. And that transformation was no small task.

Explorers and Indian traders, traveling by canoe, were the first to furnish accurate accounts of Arkansas' countryside. Once the Louisiana Purchase lands were transferred, the establishment of permanent settlements and the need for policing frontiers brought wagons and carts upon the scene. Wider paths to accommodate vehicular travel became necessary.

Both the military and the federal government needed higher type direct-travel arterial facilities to link eastern centers of commerce and government with western frontier trading and military posts thereby facilitating Indian removal and frontier defense. Costly roads could not be funded by the territories, and the areas were too sparsely settled to provide labor for constructing needed facilities. To support the nation's growing transportation needs, Congress was forced to provide funds and military manpower to build roads. The U.S. Army needed roads to move artillery and supply trains to Army outposts. Existing Indian trails were often improved to become the first roads on the frontier, and local people called them military roads.

Around 1807 John Pyeatt enlisted the aid of his neighbors in opening a road from Crystal Hill and Cadron to Arkansas Post. The north bank of the Arkansas River was followed for about fifty miles to an old Indian trail which led directly to Arkansas Post. This may have been the first road in Arkansas, but historians seem certain that it was the first constructed by Arkansas labor. Pyeatt's road appears on the 1836 map of Arkansas. John Pyeatt was in a group returning from New Orleans in the winter of 1823. He died after wading about 90 miles through ice and water between Arkansas Post and Little Rock on the Big Prairie. The frost-bitten travelers could not make a fire because their means for doing so had got-




Mule drawn wagons and dirt roads were standard means of transportation in the early 1900's.

ten wet.

The most important route in Arkansas in terms of early immigration was the Southwest Trail. This old Indian trail began west of the Mississippi River at St. Louis and followed a southwest course through southeast Missouri to Hix's Ferry in Randolph County on the Current River where it entered Arkansas and on through the central portion of the State to Fulton on the Red River, the boundary between the U.S. and Mexico. Soon after 1803 Congress declared it a military road and appropriated funds for improvement. Many adventurous persons traveled over this route to the Great Southwest to seek their fortunes.

In 1828 an east-west military road from Little Rock to Memphis was "completed" and was extended the following year to Fort Smith. As defined then, a road was "completed" when timber had been re-

moved and the sides of ditches had been cut. Only horses and light vehicles, not loaded coaches, could travel on the surface which during the rainy season often became almost entirely impassable. The federal government had spent approximately \$250,000 building the road but had made no provision for maintaining the facility. Arkansas was expected to repair it but struggling territorial general assemblies did not provide funds. Without maintenance, the road could not withstand the constant battering of heavy traffic volumes. In 1830 Congress provided \$200,000 to upgrade this key link in one of the most direct routes to the Southwest. Funds were exhausted before the route was completed as an all-weather road, and no additional funds were provided. In 1838 the Second Arkansas General Assembly assigned responsibility for building extensions and maintaining roads to the



counties when it burdened them with levying road taxes.

Advertisements calling for bids on specific sections of road indicate the constructed facilities were often low grade. Typical specifications called for the road to be "opened" to a certain width and entirely cleared. All brush and saplings six inches in diameter would be cut within four inches of the ground and all over 12 inches to within eight inches of the ground. Well-trimmed stumps were required.


The military road to the Red River near Fulton must have been constructed to such specifications. One visitor in 1834 described the road bed as being filled with rocks, stumps, mud and fallen trees. Often no bridges existed. He observed one peculiarity of Arkansas road-users. Fallen trees across roads were not removed. Instead the short detour (turn-out) round the tree made by the first traveler was followed by subsequent travelers. A fallen tree across the first turn-out caused a second detour. A road often wandered some distance from its original alignment.

Travel was still hazardous early in this Century. Potholes were bottomless pits called "mud holes" in the early 1920's. One description of oil field roads in South Arkansas brings to mind a tall tales contest. Oxen and mules were used to move the heavy steam boilers and drilling rigs over the roads and streets. One observer remembers seeing during one rainy spell "eight trapped mules buried so deeply in the mud only their heads were above the surface."

Late fall and early winter were chosen more frequently as travel times for the bulk of immigrants. During those seasons they could expect comparatively dry roads, cool weather, a minimum of insects and

arrival at their destinations before planting time.

Our ancestors were rugged individualists whose adaptability enables them to overcome the many obstacles of settlement. Times were difficult and travel from place to place included many perils. They sought a secure future for themselves and their families. Arkansas had the necessary natural resources to ensure them that opportunity. They had the desire and creativity to succeed. Our challenge is to preserve that spirit through a planned transportation system that serves today's needs and can expand to meet future needs.

NATIONAL TRANSPORTATION WEEK

Highway 71 Dedication Held at Springdale

Approximately 300 people showed up May 13 in Springdale to dedicate a 12.4 stretch of Highway 71 as part of the State's observance of National Transportation Week. Governor Bill Clinton joined the members of the State Highway Commission and local business and civic leaders in a ceremony held on the Highway 71 Overpass of Highway 68.

A 6.12-mile section from Fayetteville to Highway 68 has been opened to traffic for about a year. The section from Highway 68 to Highway 264 at Lowell was scheduled to open in June. The

total cost of the two projects is slightly more than \$40 million.

Construction is underway on a 6-mile section from Lowell to Highway 71 at Rogers at a cost of approximately \$15.7 million and a grading and structures contract on a 2.8-mile section from Highway 71 to Little Flock Road at a cost of \$3.1 million. Construction is programmed for 7.5 miles to Bella Vista, which will complete the relocation of Highway 71 from Fayetteville to Bella Vista to tie in with an already completed four lane section to the Missouri State line.

With most of the work underway on the Highway 71 segment north of Fayetteville, attention has now turned to the south where preliminary work has been underway for some time and construction scheduled to begin later this year.

The Governor told the crowd that the completed section of highway was the first step of an irreversible process to build a four-lane highway from Northwest Arkansas to I-40 at Alma.

"Because of the efforts of the Highway Commission and the availability of Federal funds, even in these difficult times, and because of all of the work by the legislators from this area, this project is going to become a reality," Clinton said.

"This is one of the fastest growing areas in America, and it has all happened in spite of the fact that we have not had the transportation network that we needed. The progress of this area is remarkable and a tribute to the character, vision and hard working habits of the people," he added.

The Governor also commended Highway Commissioner Bobby Hopper of Springdale for his hard

work in moving the Highway 71 project along. Clinton said he had urged Hopper, and his predecessor on the Commission, F.H. Martin of Fayetteville, to work toward the completion of Highway 71 and he was proud of the work they had done.

Highway Commission Chairman Patsy Thomasson said the Highway Commission had "a very strong committment to Highway 71."


"There is about 42 miles left to tie in with I-40. With the passage of the 4 cents increase in the gaso-


Following their remarks, the Governor presented the members of the Highway Commission a proclamation designating May 11-17 as National Transportation Week in Arkansas.

Sam Smith Retires After 33 Years

M.S. "Sam" Smith III, District Engineer at District 2 in Pine Bluff, retired in May after 33 years of service with the Department.

Sam began his career with the Department as a summer employee in 1949 while attending the University of Arkansas. He was assigned as an Inspector in the Forrest City area.

He graduated from the University in 1951 with a degree in Civil Engineering and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Army. He was assigned to the Corps of Engineers for two years where he was an engineering officer with Aviation Engineer Group Headquarters.

Following his discharge from the Army, he returned to Arkansas and taught math and science at Forrest City High School for a short time before he was employed by the Highway Department in 1954.

His first job was as an Instrumentman in the Construction Division. He became an Assistant Resident Engineer in 1955 and promoted to Resident Engineer in 1956. At the time of his promotion, it was noted on his evaluation form that "he is a very capable employee and has unusual abilities as an

engineer." Two years later another evaluation, this one by E.E. Hurley, who was then District Engineer at District 1, stated; "He has good judgement and we think that he has the background, leadership quality and attitude to make one of our top engineers."

Sam was promoted to Assistant Construction Engineer in 1962 and three years later be was promoted to District Engineer at District 10 in Paragould. He served in that capacity until 1976 and was transferred to Pine Bluff to take over as District Engineer after John Harris retired.

He was first elected to the Highway Employees Retirement Board of Trustees in 1972 and served in that capacity until his retirement. In 1980 he completed work for his Masters degree in Engineering.

An open house in Sam's honor was held at the District Headquarters May 15 and many of the Department's employees dropped by to wish him the best. District employees pitched in and presented Sam and his wife, Mary, with a barbeque grill to show their appreciation for his years of loyal and dedicated service.

Public Hearing Held For Highway 10

The proposed widening and reconstruction of Highway 10 west of Little Rock received support from the 100 area residents who attended a public hearing on the project May 20.

A dozen persons spoke at the hearing and all expressed support for the project. There was some concern mentioned by two of the speakers that care be taken to minimize any potential harmful environmental effects.

The proposed project calls for widening Highway 10 to five lanes from near Rodney Parham Road in Little Rock west to Taylor Loop Road, and widening the highway to four lanes from Taylor Loop Road to Highway 300. The overall length of the project is approximately 6 miles and will cost about \$5 million to construct, according to Roadway Design Engineer Bob Walters.

Several speakers requested that the Department consider extending the project about another quarter of a mile past Highway 300 to take in the area where the Joe T. Robinson High School, Middle School and Elementary School are located.

The first phase of the project would be the fivelane section, and work could begin late this year. The remainder of the work will probably begin about a year later.

Commendation Awards Presented

Willie Anderson, Senior Mechanic at District 1 in Wynne, received commendation awards from both the Highway and Transportation Department and the Arkansas Department of Labor in May for his efforts in saving the life of 19-year-old Curt Moore earlier this year.

Anderson, who had taken the First Aid Course offered by the Department on March 4 and 5, was traveling on Highway 1 near Cherry Valley March 11 when he drove up on an automobile accident that had just occurred. When he reached the vehicle he noticed that Moore was unconscious and bleeding profusely. He removed the victim from the vehicle and cleared his breathing passage and stopped the bleeding until an ambulance arrived.

In a letter of appreciation to the Department, Moore's parents said their son is alive today because of Anderson's quick action and knowledge of what to do. "We appreciate the Highway Department making this training available to their men. We wanted you to know how well Willie used his training. We have known Willie for years and he has always been our friend. Now we owe him for our son's life." This letter was signed by W.J. and Judy Moore.

Although it may sound like something out of a Buck Rogers movie, the device is really something right out of the local grocery store checkout counter, according to Highway Police Chief John Bailey.

"The device reads 'bar codes' similar to those in grocery stores," Bailey said. "A thin bright red light reads a bar code decal affixed to a truck cab and feeds the information to a computer, which would display the information on a television screen. The truck's identification number, its make, model and color, and whether it has a permit to carry hazardous material, would instantly be available on the screen for the officer to check," he said.

Bill Rader, an industrial engineering professor at the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville, explained the device at the recent meeting of the Department's Research Board.

Rader was asked to conduct research on such a system. He said the next step is to try out the system under actual operating conditions. About 2,000 bar code decals will be purchased and placed on the cabs of co-operating trucking companies and tried out at the weigh station at Alma on I-40.

Eventually, portable systems could be devised so that an officer could use a hand-held gun to check a bar code decal on a truck moving down a highway.

A.H.P. Shooters Win Awards

The First Annual Arkansas Highway Police "PPC" (Police Pistol Combat) Championship Matches were conducted May 15. A four-member team from each Highway Police District competed for Best Team and Top Shooter. AHP District 5, firing a designated number of rounds within a certain time frame at various distances, walked away with the top honors. Trophies were presented to Top Shooter Cpl. Joe Davis, each winning team member, and to the winning District by AHP Chief John Bailey.



- Almost 100 Years of AHTD Service -

When one person serves 38½ years with the Department that's a feat in itself. But for that person to be a member of a family that has served a total of 97½ years, then you've really got something to be proud of.

That's the case for Hurley Perkins of North Little Rock. Hurley is the third member of his family to work for the Highway and Transportation Department, following in the footsteps of his father, J.C. Perkins, Sr., and his older brother, J.C. Perkins, Jr.

The Perkins' family association with the Department began in 1931 when J.C., Sr. began his career as a Bridge Resident Engineer. He ater served as Bridge Location Engineer, Assistant State Construction Engineer, and District Engineer. He retired with 25 years of service and passed away in Harrison at the age of 74.

J.C., Jr. started with the Department in 1931 also. He began as a Rodman and was promoted through the ranks to Inspector, Instrumentman, and in 1943 to Resident Engineer at the age of 30. In 1953 he was


Division Superintendent at District 9 in Harrison, serving in that capacity for six years. He was transferred back to the Construction Division as a Resident Engineer in charge of projects on I-55, I-40 and I-30. He was promoted to State Maintenance Engineer and later retired in 1974 with 34 years of service.

Hurley began his highway career in 1938 on a wash-boring rig for Bridge Surveys. In 1941 he was employed as Instrumentman in Surveys, promoted to Location Engineer, Resident Engineer, Staff Engineer in charge of Final Estimates, Assistant State Construction Engineer, Assistant State Maintenance Engineer, and District Engineer at Harrison, Russellville and Little Rock, thus become the first District Engineer to head three Districts. Hurley retired in 1982 with a total of 38½ years of service.

Hurley has remained very active promoting the Department since his retirement. He was instrumental in organizing the AHTD Retirees Assocation and served as its first President.
