AHTD Departmental Reorganization and Promotions Announced

Last year's early retirement incentive program for State employees created a number of vacancies in several top management positions within the Department. In addition to the personnel changes, several organizational changes have also occurred.

Personnel Changes

On December 10, 1987, the Arkansas Highway Commission announced that it would hire Maurice Smith as Director of Highways and Transportation to replace Henry Gray, who had announced his retirement. Smith became Director January 1, 1988 and he is no stranger to Department employees. 
Also, the Construction and Maintenance Divisions have been restructured under the Construction and Maintenance Division. This restructuring is for the purpose of providing better utilization of personnel within

Barges Damage Bridge at DeValls Bluff

The Highway 70 bridge across the White River at De Valls Bluff will be closed at least 6 to 9 months to repair damages sustained Janua 7 when one of the lift span piers was struck by a tug and four barges moving downstream. The east pier on the 63-year-old bridge was knocked about 12" off center at the top according to AHTD engineers who were on the scene within hours of the accident. The overhead trusses were also damaged by the counterweights on the lift span, which was in the raised position to allow river traffic to pass at the time of the accident.


The tug involved in the accident, the Amy Ross, is owned by the Caruthersville Marine Service of Caruthersville, Missouri. Eyewitnesses observed that the tug and barges struck an old railroad bridge just upstream from the Highway 70 bridge moments before slamming into the pier. Two DeValls Bluff men were stranded in the operators booth on the lift span for over two hours after the accident, but neither were injured.

The closing marks the third time this bridge has been closed in the last 24 years. The most recent, was a 22-month span between February 1972 and December 1973. At that time, erosion caused the footing under the same east pier to partially collapse, causing the pier to lean about eight feet off center. The bridge had to be dismantled and a new pier constructed.

Detours have been set up at Biscoe and at Hazen to route through traffic over to Interstate 40 which parallels Highway 70. Also, the Department has upgraded what is known as Webb Lake Road to help accommodate local traffic. Webb Lake Road is a gravel road which connects Highway 70 near DeValls Bluff to the rest area on Interstate 40 just north of DeValls Bluff.

The old bridge was built by the Missouri Valley Bridge and Iron Company of Leavenworth, Kansas for the White River Bridge Company, a private firm that built several toll bridges durng the first two decades of this century. The bridge was opened for traffic on December 31, 1924.

Good Roads: The Link to Economic Development

Governor Bill Clinton says that he definitely sees the need for, and supports, a four-lane highway program in Arkansas. But, he says, it needs to be presented to the people as part of a comprehensive development plan. "We have to have a four-lane program," Clinton said. "It will only work if you do it with an education program, with an economic development program, and with programs to deal with our other resources."

The Governor made his comments to a crowd of about 200 people attending the annual conference of the Arkansas Good Roads/ Transportation Council on January 21 at the Little Rock Hilton.

A major focus of comments by Governor Clinton and others was the proposed Economic Development Corridor Improvement plan, or four-lane program as it is commonly referred. The plan is designed to connect every city with a population of 10,000 or more with a four-lane highway and link all cities expected to have populations of more than 5,000 within twenty years to the four-lane arterial system. This would be accomplished by building 1,630 miles of four-lane highways from existing two-lane highways, 190 miles of three-lane highways, and 620 miles of improvements to enhance tourist and commodity flow.

Governor Clinton pledged to work with those in attendance to develop a highway program and workable method of financing it. He suggested that the final plan be drawn up by mid-year to give him and the state legislators time to explain it to voters and get support before the Legislature meets in January 1989.

AHTD Director Maurice Smith echoed the Governor's comments. He went on to further explain the basis for the four-lane program. Smith said the plan was based on economic development and the potential for economic growth rather than traffic needs. So far, he said, the plan has been extremely well received around the State. Smith urged the members of the audience to proceed quickly with the information gathering process. "The Highway Commission has developed this plan at the request of others," he said. "Now the Commission needs the help of others to develop the facts and figures to show what our potential is. . . It's going to take all of us working together to move Arkansas ahead on the road to economic development."

A panel discussion was held to discuss the four-lane highway program recently adopted in the state of Mississippi. Panelists included Sam Waggoner, Chairman of the Mississippi Highway Commission; Chip Morgan, spokesman for Advocating Highways for Economic Advancement and Development in Mississippi; and Arkansas Highway Commissioners Bobby Hopper and Raymond Pritchett.

The Mississippi plan consists of the construction of 1,077 miles of four-lane highways over the next 14 years. It was pointed out that although the Mississippi plan and the proposed Arkansas plan differ in many ways, particularly financing, they both have to be sold to the legislature and the public in similar ways.

Mississippi's advice to Arkansas was to develop a specific plan and not to deviate from that plan.

Plans for New Bridge Supported

About fifty years ago, a group of Warren merchants traveled to Little Rock to convince then-Governor Harvey Parnell not to build a bridge over the Ouachita River at Moro Bay. The bridge, the merchants feared, would divert business from Warren to El Dorado.

It seems that times have changed and apparently so have people's feelings. On January 14, more than 150 people, many of them Warren merchants, filled the Hermitage Public School Cafeteria for a public hearing to express their support for the proposed Moro Bay bridge across the Ouachita River.

The Moro Bay Ferry opened for business as a free ferry in March 1965 and is one of four free ferries still in operation on Arkansas highways. The replacement of this ferry is signifi-

cant because it marks the first time that federal bridge replacement funds will be used for the replacement of a ferry. The Highway Act of 1987 passed by Congress contained a provision to make this type of construction eligible for federal bridge replacement funds.

Paul DeBusk, AHTD Roadway Design Engineer, described the alternate routes that were considered for the project. The preferred route, he explained, actually involved the building of two bridges; one over the Ouachita River and one over Raymond Lake. The proposed 3.5-mile project would begin at the intersection of Highways 15 and 275 and extend north and east across the Ouachita River and Raymond Lake and would link up with Highway 15 about one mile north of Moro Bay. Both the new roadway and the new bridges would consist of two twelve-foot travel lanes with 6-foot shoulders.

Among those who spoke at the hearing, in favor of the project, were State Representative John Lipton and State Senator Jim Scott, both of Warren; Hermitage Mayor J.O. Harrod, and former State Representative Bill Wells, who sponsored legislation authorizing the construction of the ferry in the early 1960's.

Construction costs for the new bridges and roadway are estimated to be approximately \$9 million. Construction will be completed in phases, with the first phase scheduled to begin within a year. Estimated completion date for the entire project is the mid-1990's.

Stereoplotter Donated to UALR

One of the Photogrammetry Section's old projection-type stereoplotters has found a new home at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock.

The Highway Commission agreed to the donation in January of last year following the authorization to purchase new stereoplotting equipment.

UALR's Engineering Technology School will use the equipment to train students. One of the students, Sonny Sanders, has been spending several hours each week in the Photogrammetry Section learning how to operate the equipment.

Ground Is Broken on Jonesboro Bypass Project

Construction on the long awaited U.S. 63 Bypass access control demonstration project in Jonesboro is underway. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held December 12 for a new overpass/interchange at U.S. 63 and State Highway 1B (Harrisburg Road), which is to be the first of four overpasses/interchanges to be built along the Jonesboro expressway.

Two U.S. Congressmen were on hand for the ceremony along with Arkansas Highway Commissioners Rodney Slater, Ron Harrod, and Bill Clark, as well as many local officials. Jonesboro Mayor Hubert Brodell called the event "a very special day in Jonesboro."

A lack of overpasses spanning the expressway was blamed for the large number of accidents which have occurred since it was opened in the early 1970's. The 1978 Surface Transportation Act passed by Congress authorized funding for the access control demonstration project to make the road safer. However, the funds were locked up by President Reagan several years ago during budgetary cuts.

Arkansas' First District Congressman Bill Alexander is being given much credit for securing the approximately \$9.8 million for construction of the four overpasses and interchanges on the U.S. 63 Bypass. Congressman Alexander was joined at the groundbreaking by Congressman Glenn M. Anderson of California, chairman of the Surface Transportation Committee of the House Public Works Committee, which authorized funding for the project. Said Anderson of Alexander, "If it was not for him, you wouldn't have the project."

Congressman Anderson further explained that federal highway money is divided among the states by a formula. "This project is not a part of that formula", stated Anderson. "This was a demonstration project that Bill Alexander was the author of."

Highway Commissioner Rodney Slater, of Jonesboro, said Caraway and Stadium would be the next overpass projects. "We will have to see where our money is at that point," noted Slater. He went on to say that U.S. 49 would receive the next strong consideration, followed by the Willow Creek area.

A \$3.4 million contract was awarded in mid-October to Robertson, Inc., of Poplar Bluff, Missouri, for the State Highway 1B interchange. Officials said that interchange should be completed by mid-1989. The pace of construction on the U.S. 63 Bypass project will depend entirely on the availability of money.





TOP THREE MANAGEMENT OFFICIALS RETIRE

The top three management officials of the Department retired December 31, to take advantage of the early retirement incentive program passed by the State Legislature early in 1987.

Director Henry Gray, Chief Engineer Billy K. Cooper and Assistant Director for Administration Gip I. Robertson, Jr., were among the 256 AHTD employees who retired under the program last year.

Gray served as Director for nearly 15 years. He had been employed by the Department for 25 years. He began his career as head of the Right of Way Division in 1962 after serving ten years with the Game and Fish Commission. Before being named Director in March 1973, he served as Assistant to the Chief Engineer for Administration and Realty, Assistant Director for Administration and Realty, and Assistant Director.

He served on numerous committees of AASHTO and SASHTO and is a past president of both organizations. Throughout his career, he worked tirelessly to improve the image of the Department and to develop programs to enhance employee productivity and morale. He has been instrumental in the passage of legislation to fund highway improvements and new highway programs.

Cooper began his 33-year career with the Department following graduation from the University of Arkansas where he was named the outstanding civil engineer in his graduating class. During his first year with the Department he received a National Fellowship in Engineering from Purdue University. After receiving his masters degree from Purdue, he returned to the Department and served as Traffic Engineer, Assistant Planning Engineer, and Engineer of Roadway Design. He was named Chief Engineer in 1970 and served in that capacity longer than any other person in the history of the Department.

Robertson began his 34-year career in 1954 as a Right of Way Agent. He later served as Section Head of the Right of Way Administration Section, Assistant Division Head and Division Head of Right of Way. In 1973 he was promoted to Assistant Director for Administration,

As Assistant Director, he was active in representing the best interest of the Department's employees. He served on the State Employees Insurance Advisory Committee and was responsible for numerous modifications in the employees insurance program. He also was responsible for the development and administration of the Department's Tax Unit and the implementation of the current pay plan for Department employees.

It will be hard to replace the combined 92 years of experience these top three managers took with them upon retirement. We wish them, and all of the other 253 employees who retired, the best in the years ahead.

Highway 165 Improvements Dedicated at Stuttgart

Ceremonies officially dedicating the widening of Highway 165 south of Stuttgart were conducted November 25. Six miles of the highway were widened and resurfaced as part of the improvements on the Rural Road Program.

Highway Commissioner Bill Clark of Hot Springs, noted that the improvements have been a top concern of the Commission and local cials for a number of years, however, until the passage of the Rural Road Program in 1985, money for the project was not available.

"This six-mile improvement is the first of several projects programmed for Highway 165 from Stuttgart to Gillett. All of the work in the future will also be funded with 100 percent state funds under the Rural Road Program," Clark said.

He told the audience that members of the Commission have had numerous conversations with local and county officials concerning the highways and he said their support, along with the support of State Senator Mike Beebe and Representative Wanda Northcutt, was instrumental in the passage of the Rural Road Program.

Clark said the next phase of work will be the widening of Highway 165 through Stuttgart from Highway 130 to Highway 79. Plans call for the highway to be widened to four-lanes.

Nearly \$1.3 million in state funds was spent to improve the highway, which had only 10-foot travel lanes and no shoulders. The Highway Commission awarded a contract to Graves and Associates, of Pine Bluff, to widen the highway to provide for two 12-foot travel lanes with six-foot paved shoulders.
