## **Safety First!**

## GROUNDBREAKING

## Second Phase of Jonesboro Access Control Demonstration Project Underway

Another step was taken on March 17 toward the completion of the Access Control Demonstration Project on the Jonesboro Bypass. A ground-breaking ceremony was held on that date to signify the beginning of construction for an interchange and overpass at the Highway 63/Caraway Road intersection in Jonesboro.

A \$3.3 million contract was awarded in January to Robertson, Inc., of Poplar Bluff, Missouri, for the Caraway Road project which has a scheduled completion date of August 1990. The first phase of the ACDP, the construction of an

overpass/interchange at the Highway 1B (Harrisburg Road) intersection, was begun in

October 1987. It is scheduled for completion in the fall of this year.

The Access Control Demonstration Project involves the construction of four overpasses and interchanges on the U.S. 63 Bypass. Arkansas' First District Congressman Bill Alexander has been given much credit for securing approximately \$9.8 million for the project. "That's the job of Congress," Alexander told those in attendance at the groundbreaking luncheon, "to make a raid on the Treasury for the people we represent."

Rodney Slater of Jonesboro
aid that the Stadium Drive
intersection would be the next
overpass project. "We will have
to see where our money is at
that point," noted Slater, adding
that the U.S. 49 intersection
would probably receive the
next strong consideration.

In addition to Alexander and Slater, Highway Commission Chairman Raymond Pritchett, a native of east Arkansas, addressed the group at the luncheon following the groundbreaking. He said thatthe definition of the term "adequate transportation" has

changed over the years and that the challenge to provide a quality transportation system was greater than ever. He said that the construction of more four-lane highways in Arkansas was "an idea that is too strong to die and too strong to give up on."

Included in the groundbreaking activities was a bus tour of industrial and highway projects underway in the area. This was provided to acquaint the guests with the role that transportation has played in the economic development in and around Jonesboro.

## Highway 79B Dedicated at Fordyce

The recently completed widening of Highway 79B in Fordyce is a prime example of what good can come from government, according to Ron Harrod, Vice Chariman of the State Highway Commission.

Speaking at a dedication ceremony May 12, Harrod told the crowd that the one-half mile segment of highway is the first phase of an overall proposal to widen Highway 79B all the way through the city of Fordyce. "This first section is where the most congestion was being experienced," Harrod said. "This section was identified by the City of Fordyce as the top priority for widening."

Harrod expressed his gratitude to the city for cooperating with the Department in the early stages of planning for the project. "In this case, the City of Fordyce and the Highway Department were able to sit down and work together to make this project a reality," he said. The state agreed to acquire the right-of-way for the project and the city will reimburse the state. The Highway Commission awarded a \$425,968 contract to R.N. Reynolds Construction Co. of Camden in April 1988 for the work.

A contract between the Arkansas State Highway and Transportation Department and the Dardanelle and Russellville Railway (D&R) for the rehabilitation of the rail line from North Dardanelle to Russellville was signed May 24.

Maurice Smith, Director of Highways and Transportation, and William K. Robbins, Jr., President and General Manager of the D&R signed the contract at a brief ceremony held at the Russellville Chamber of Commerce office.

The Dardanelle to
Russellville line is the seventh
rehabilitation project to be
undertaken by the Department
and brings to 190 miles the
total miles of track to be rehabilitated in Arkansas.

The 5.2 mile line, which provides freight service connections with the Union Pacific Railroad at Russellville, was previously a subsidiary of the Richmond Tank Car Company of Houston, Texas. Robbins purchased the line in 1987 and applied for federal railroad rehabilitation funds through the AHTD. The line serves several small businesses and plants, including the Dow Chemical Company. Many of the busi-

nesses are totally dependent on economical rail service for their survival. If the line is abandoned and salvaged, Pope County would lose a real and personal tax assessment of about \$500,000.

The estimated cost of the project is \$488,156. The D&R will receive \$300,000 through the federal grant program and will be responsible for furnishing the remainder of the funds o complete the project. The work includes ditching, ties, ballast, rail, rail surfacing, weed control and other track material as needed.

Rail service is currently being provided five days a week for customers along the D&R line. Due to the poor condition of the tracks, trains must operate at a maximum speed of five-miles-per-hour. Some freight tonnage has been lost in recent years because of poor track conditions and the availability of specialty cars. The new owner plans an aggressive marketing campaign to add freight tonnage and acquire specialty cars.

Rehabilitation of the line is expected to provide direct and indirect benefits of \$8.2 million to the citizens of the area, the

shippers and the operating railroad. Several businesses have acquired new accounts in areas where it was not economical to ship by truck since the new owner of the line began operating. Future manufacturing sites are located adjacent to the existing line and rail service could be easily provided as new plants locate in the area.

The Railroad Revitalization and Regulatory Reform Act of 1976 required each state to develop a State Rail Plan in order to receive federal rail assistance. The State Highway and Transportation Department is the agency responsible for administering the funds, awarding the contracts, and inspecting the work as it is performed.



# Three Public Hearings Held Around the State

## Highway 165 at England

The England City Hall was site of a public hearing on March 28 to give residents of the area an opportunity to express their opinions on the proposed widening of Highway 165 (Fordyce St.) in England.

The proposed project would begin near Allis Street and would proceed east to the city limits. Total project length would be approximately one mile. Under the proposed plans, the existing two-lane roadway would be widened to include two 13-foot travel lanes with a 12-foot center-turn lane.

Paul DeBusk, of Roadway Design, explained the details of the project design to those gathered, and Bob Colford and Danny Arendt of the Right of Way Division, discussed the Department's appraisal, acquisition, and relocation procedures.

DeBusk cited that recent traffic counts for the area showed that about 6,640 vehicles traveled that stretch of road each day. By the year 2009, he said, that number was expected to increase to about 8,770. He also explained that this project was part of a series of improvements scheduled for Highway 165 between Interstate 440 and Dumas. The

section between I-440 and England was improved in a project that was completed earlier this year.

Following the presentations by AHTD personnel, those in attendance were given a chance to make a statement or ask questions concerning the project. Although no one spoke specifically against the improvement, many concerns were brought out. Questions about parking, traffic signals, crosswalks for the schoolchildren, drainage ditches, and storm drains were answered by the Department staff.

## Military Road in Benton

Approximately 90 persons were in attendance at the Tyndall Park Activities Center on April 17 to hear the Department's plans for the proposed widening of Military Road in Benton. The 1.3-mile long project would widen the roadway to five lanes between Main Street and Congo Road. Also, Congo Road would be widened to three lanes beginning at Military Road and extending 400 feet to the north.

The project was deemed necessary because Department studies showed that more

than 16,000 vehicles a day
were using the 3-lane Military
Road. That number is expected
to increase to more than
26,000 per day in 20 years.

AHTD Roadway Design Engineer Paul DeBusk explained to the group that, except for a short section of Military Road, this was not an AHTD project. "This is a city project," DeBusk said. "The Federal government will pay 75% of the cost and the city will pay the remaining 25%."

Benton businessman

Curtis Ferguson spoke in favor of the project. He said that traffic on Military Road was reaching the saturation point and that something had to be done to prevent the road from being 'choked to death'. "I'm concerned about where we will be if this project doesn't go through," Ferguson said. "If this project does not go through, the next generation of business investment will not be on Military Road."

Dr. Donald Dixon, a Ben-

ton dentist, stated, "My views are about the same as Curtis', except he's for it and I'm against it." Dr. Dixon said that widening the road would make it like a freeway and increase the traffic. "We need less traffic on Military, not more," he said.

Benton Mayor Rodney
Larsen said it was time for
Benton to take advantage of
the funding that was available.
He said that the city could
afford its share of the cost
without a tax increase.

## Proposed New Bridge for Cherokee Village

A public hearing was held Thursday, April 27, at the North Golf Course Recreation Center in Cherokee Village to discuss a proposed new bridge for the area.

A majority of the 200 people who attended the meeting agreed that a new bridge was needed, but disagreed on the location and the type of structure that should be built.

The proposed State Aid project would replace a low-water bridge crossing the South Fork of the Spring River in Cherokee Village. Residents of the area, many of whom are retired, argued that heavy rains caused the river to rise above the bridge, cutting them off from emergency services.

But the proposed new bridge would be in the middle of the North Golf Course, and opponents said that the beauty and integrity of the area would be severely damaged if it were

to be built there.

They also said that the earthen embankments supporting the approaches to the bridge would act like a dam during heavy rains, causing more flooding upstream. They supported building a bridge at a different location.


Highway and Transportation Department State Aid Engineer Jake Weston outlined the history of the project and explained the reasoning used in the design process.

He said the project was initiated by Sharp County
Judge Frank Arnold, who was doing so at the request of area residents. "The Highway and Transportation Department," Weston explained, "only acts as a consultant on state aid projects. The county selects the location and we peform the necessary engineering and design work."

Judge Arnold stressed that the most important issue involved was seeing that better access was provided to the residents of the area.

He concluded by saying that an alternate location would be looked at before a final decision was made.

# Deficient Bridges Again Drawing Attention




A typical example of a narrow, one-lane functionally obsolete bridge in Arkansas.

In light of recent bridge collapses in other states, attention is again being focused on the bridge situation as it exists in Arkansas. Although the situation is not considered a crisis here, it is generally acknowledged that the State's system of bridges is in need of some major improvements.

Of the 12,989 bridges in the State, 43% are considered deficient in design or are deteriorating. This puts Arkansas slightly above the national average of 41%. However, of the 12,989 total, only 6,687 are maintained by the Highway and Transportation Department. Of that number, 22% are considered deficient. This means that although the state maintained bridges are faring better than average, city and county maintained bridges are not holding up as well. Sixty-six percent of the city and county maintained bridges in the state are deficient.

It is estimated that it would cost \$1.25 billion to fix the bridges on the state highway system, and an additional \$700 million to repair the city and county maintained bridges. The current federal outlay for bridge maintenance is approxi-

mately \$18 million per year. Following the 1967 collapse of the Silver Creek Bridge over the Ohio River, resulting in 46 deaths, Congress established Federal law requiring all states to develop and implement an on-going bridge inspection program. The Federal Aid Highway Act of 1968 required the Secretary of Transportation, with the state agencies, to develop the National Bridge Inspection Standards (NBIS). The Act also required each state to establish and maintain a current inventory of all bridges on the Federal Aid Highway System. The Surface Transportation Assisance Act of 1978 greatly expanded the program to require that all bridge-length

structures on the public highway system (state, county, and city) be inspected at least once every two years.

David Lambert, AHTD
Heavy Bridge Maintenance Engineer, and Ed Fain, Staff
Structures Engineer, recently
attended a Federal Highway
Administration sponsored workshop dealing with bridge inspection and management.
The workshop addressed the more stringent NBIS criteria that the FHWA will soon be implementing.

Workshop participants were informed that scouring of bridge foundations is the most common cause of damage to bridges during floods. Scouring is the term used to describe the washing away of the riverbed or other material from around the footing of a bridge. The FHWA is putting great emphasis on the need for states to evaluate both existing bridges and newly designed bridges for scour potential. According to Lambert, the AHTD has developed and submitted to the FHWA a draft plan regarding scour evaluation of existing bridges in Arkansas.

Other topics discussed at the workshop included the need for states to identify bridges which require inspection more often that once every two years. States must also identify and designate in their bridge inventory file bridges with fracture critical members, bridges requiring underwater inspections, and bridges with features requiring special moni-

toring and evaluations.

Due to the lack of sufficient funding for bridge improvements, the FHWA continues to encourage all states to develop a Bridge Management System. A comprehensive system for managing bridge im-

provement activities in a consistent and efficient manner would help keep bridges in better shape. Lambert and Fain say that the Arkansas Highway and Transportation Department is considering implementing such a system.

## Research Committee Receives Recommendations

A report recommending steps to minimize pavement damage caused by the "lift" axle on four-axle trucks was presented to engineers at the 48th Transportation Research Committee Meeting held in Fayetteville, March 28-29. The Committee also agreed to fund four projects for the fiscal year 1990 Research Program.

Dr. Thomas Parsons, an Assistant Professor of Civil Engineering at Arkansas State University, began performing research on the effects of the "lift" axle in July 1987 and concluded the project last November. His research included a review of the technologies that exist in regard to the "lift" axle and what restrictions exist in other states.

After surveying all 50 states, Dr. Parsons found that no two states view the use of the axle in the same way. Some states do not allow the use of the truck at all; while others have various restrictions.

Dr. Parsons' study concluded that the "lift" axle is more damaging than other axles, especially when the truck is negotiating a turn, which is when scuffing of the pavement occurs.

A test plate, developed at ASU, was embedded into the pavement and the lateral forces generated by passing

double, tri-, and quad-axle trucks over the test plate were obtained.

Among his recommendations, Dr. Parsons suggested that each axle should be required to carry its share of the total load; require the "lift" axle pressure regulator to be located outside the truck cab; require the "lift" axle to have castering or self-steering wheels; and restrict the load capacity on the axle to the rated capacity, the legal limit, or 600-650 pounds per inch of tire tread width.

Any changes in the present requirements for "lift" axles would have to be made in the form of legislation to amend existing laws. The Research Committee has taken the recommendations under ad-

visement.

The four projects to be undertaken by the Committee in 1990 are:

- 1) Permit Fee Study;
- 2) Reducing lead based paint from bridges;
- 3) Slope Stability Analysis Program; and
- 4) Pavement Management Records System.

The Research Section of the Materials and Research Division is responsible for the administration of all highway research contracts to the State's universities and for conducting in-house research. The TRC oversees and directs the work performed.

Calvin Peevy, ACE for Operations, serves as chairman of the TRC and Bob Walters, ACE for Design, is vice-chairman.

# Understanding the Need For Employer Support

At least one weekend a month and several weeks out of the year, a large number of Highway and Transportation Department employees trade in their hard hats, safety vests, laptop computers, and other tools of the trade for an army helmet, flight suit, and even another laptop computer, to perform their duties as members of the National Guard or Reserve. They are citizens who undertake an added responsibility for the security of the Nation. In turn, they require support and understanding of their employer and fellow workers.

Jane Wilson, head of the Department's Human Resources Division, was recently treated to a first-hand look at how the Air National Guard performs and the training it provides its members. Wilson was one of six Arkansans selected to attend the Air National Guard's Business and Industry Day at McGheeTyson Air National Guard Base in Knoxville, Tennessee, She was nominated by Don Crain, a 12year employee of the Department. Crain is an AHTD Safety Officer who pulls military duty as Ground Safety NCOIC with the Air National Guard's 189th Tactical Airlift Group at Little Rock Air Force Base. He has

18 years of service with the Guard and holds the rank of Master Sergeant.

"I though it was important for Ms. Wilson to learn more about the Guard and Reserve," Crain said. "After all, there are many department employees who are required to take time off from their jobs to perform military duty and all requests for military leave must go through the Human Resources Division for approval," he said.

It was appropriate that the 189th was sponsoring Wilson's trip since at least eight Central Office employees are Air National Guard members who attend training sessions at Little Rock AFB each month.

"I had no knowledge whatso-ever about the Guard before I took this trip," Wilson said. "I just thought they trained for war. I didn't know there was such an emphasis on leadership training and supervisory skills."

The participants from Arkansas were joined by business leaders from Texas, Kansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Missouri, Colorado and New Mexico. The event began for Wilson and two other Pulaski County employers, Rick Ezell, Jacksonville Fire Chief, and Jerry Halsell of the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce, on

April 19 with a meeting with Colonel Shelby G. Bryant, Commander of the 189th, where they were briefed on the unit's mission and responsibilities. The 189th is the only Air Guard unit that teaches basic flight training to Air Force, Air National Guard, Navy, Marines, Coast Guard, and International C-130 aircrew members. They flew from Little Rock Air Force Base aboard a Colorado Air Guard T-43. Three Fort Smith area employers also accompanied them on the trip. On April 20 they spent the day attending briefings, classroom sessions at the Professional Military Education Center, graduation ceremonies for the Air Guard's NCO Leadership Academy. and ending with an awards banquet for the NCO graduates. The return flight to Little Rock on April 21 was aboard a Texas Air Guard C-130.

"I was very impressed with what they offered in the way of leadership training. There was much more emphasis on human resources than I anticipated," she said. Wilson was particularly impressed with the communication skills taught at the Academy.

The NCO Academy is a sixweek session which covers the many military disciplines as well as the importance of



community involvement on the part of the individual.

A lot of stereotypes regarding the Guard and Reserve were dispelled by the trip, Ms. Wilson commented. As a result, she now has a more positive attitude about the military in general, and the Guard in particular.

"I also have a new respect for the Department employees who are Guard or Reserve members. By being guardsmen they are gaining something from their training that also benefits the Department. I have a better understanding of the value of what they are doing and how it relates to the Department," she said.

The Director of the Air National Guard, Major General Phillip Killey, told the participants that the reserve forces have been taking on more and more responsibility for the Nation's defense in recent years. He pointed out that the Air Guard provides 85% of the fighter-interceptor force, 50% of the reconnaissance force, and 35% of the tactical airlift force of the total Air Force. Because of this additional responsibility, training is increasingly important in maintaining the readiness levels required to perform

the missions, the General said.

"Generally, I think our supervisors resent having to let some of their people go for military training each year," Wilson said. "But I believe they should re-think that attitude and consider the rewards of that training for the individual, as well as the Department."

"I'm glad I had the opportunity to go to this session in Knoxville. I hope the Guard and Reserve members of the Department nominate their supervisors for similar programs in the future," she added.

## Potter Runs Boston Marathon

Even though Don Potter is chairman of the AHTD committee that recruited participants for the March of Dimes Walk-A-Thon, he admits that walking is not exactly his cup of tea. No, Don Potter would much rather *run* ten miles than walk it. As a matter of fact, ten miles is less than half the distance that he ran recently in the Boston Marathon.

The Boston Marathon was held this year on Monday, April 17. More than

6,400 runners took part in the race, including Potter and 22 other Arkansans. For Don, this was his second Boston Maration. He also competed there in 1983.

Don completed the 26 mile, 385 yard course in 3 hours, 31 minutes, and 41 seconds. Even though he defeated more than half the runners in the race, he was not satisfied with his time. "I had a bad day, but I enjoyed it all," he told a reporter shortly after completing the race. "It was most exciting. I enjoyed it all."

Potter, who began running in 1976, heads the Hydraulics Section of the Surveys Division. He qualified for the Boston Marathon in December 1988 at the Dallas White Rock Marathon.



### John Hume Papers Donated to UCA Library



While most of us spend the majority of our time looking to the future and trying to plan ahead, it is often nice to pause and look back to our past and remember those people and events that have influenced our lives. One such influential person who touched so many lives at AHTD was Mr. John Hume, V.

Mr. Hume, who died in 1987, worked at the Department from 1950 until his retirement in 1981 making many friends along the way. During that time, he compiled a collection of research papers and photographs dealing with the Highway Department and its history. This research collection was recently donated to the Archives at

the University of Central Arkansas in Conway by Mr. Hume's family.

A reception was held May 9 to honor Mr. Hume and his work. Tom Dillard, Director of the UCA Archives, says that the bulk of the material in the collection consists of printed materials and photographs relating to the AHTD. The collection also contains some personal papers and an assortment of miscellaneous political papers. Only a few of the documents are dated prior to the late 1940's, says Dillard, with most of them being dated between the late 1940's and the late 1970's.
