

## Director's Message

#### **Forward Steps**

The June passage of new federal highway legislation by the U.S. Congress means the Department now has a better feel for the financial resources that may be available to address our ever-growing highway needs. The bad news is, it isn't enough to meet all the needs and it will require an increase in available state matching dollars.

When the Commission embarked on a series of 16 regional public meetings earlier this year, information was presented showing \$7.2 billion in highway



needs over the next ten years. No one disputed that figure. As a matter of fact, the public presented the Commission with an additional \$7 billion in projects that they would like to see undertaken. That is a total of \$14.2 billion to address our identified needs and to give the public the additional projects they want.

The passage of the new federal legislation is good news, but the additional monies it will bring to the state fall far short of what is needed. It is estimated that the Commission will need approximately \$400 million annually to address the \$7 billion in identified needs. The new federal bill will provide us with about one-fifth of that amount annually.

A point that cannot be overlooked is the additional state funds that will be needed to match the new federal dollars. Federal funds must be matched with state funds. It is estimated that the Commission will have to have approximately \$16 million annually to match the new federal dollars. Without a source of new state funds that will be a very difficult challenge.

So where do we go from here? No one disputes that our state has many pressing needs when it comes to our highway system. The Commission has clearly stated that need, and the public has clearly spoken about the highway system it desires. But the Commission cannot raise revenues. The process to identify sources of additional state revenues, led by the Highway Commission, is underway. The regional meetings and the recent 1998 Arkansas Transportation Summit were positive steps. Let's hope the upcoming 1999 legislative session will provide the necessary matching funds to match the increase in federal dollars and additional revenues to improve the state's transportation system.

# Commission Concludes Series of Regional Meetings

The Arkansas Highway Commission concluded its series of 16 regional public meetings by holding seven meetings in the month of March, nearly the same amount they had held the previous two months combined. Meetings were held March 3 in Hot Springs, March 5 in Batesville, March 9 in Fort Smith, March 10 in Springdale, March 17 in Forrest City, March 19 in Mena, and March 31 in Little Rock.

The busy month wrapped up the series of successful meetings that were attended by nearly 2,000 people around the state. "We heard about what we thought we would hear," commented Commission Chairman Bobby Hopper of Springdale. "The people are not satisfied with

current progress on our highway system, and they indicate they are willing to support a new highway program."

The answer to how a new highway program will be paid for is not quite as clear. Based on statements made at the meetings and comments taken from comment forms returned to the Department, increased fees on heavy trucks was the most-mentioned response. Increasing the pergallon tax on diesel fuel, transferring the existing sales tax on new and used vehicles and associated parts and services, and an increase in the per-gallon tax on gasoline were also suggestions heard at the meetings. It is generally agreed that a combination of sources will be needed to provide sufficient funds for any type of

meaningful highway program.

The Commission scheduled the 1998 Arkansas Transportation Summit July 7 to bring together transportation decision-makers from around the state to discuss how to proceed toward the next legislative session. Information gathered from the meetings, as well as the Department's Highway Profile, Condition and Needs report, was used as a basis for discussion at the summit meeting.

"All in all, the Commission is pleased with the way the meetings turned out," Hopper commented. "Members of the AHTD staff did a great job in making all the necessary arrangements for the regional meetings and the summit."

## **Arkansas Highway Commission Tours Highway 71 Relocation Project**

The Highway Commission spent Tuesday, March 10, traveling from Fort Smith, where a regional meeting was held the night before, to Springdale, the site of the next regional meeting. But they took an indirect way in order to see the Highway 71 relocation project.

District 4 Engineer Harold Beaver and District 4 Construction Engineer Joe Shipman led the Commissioners, members of the AHTD staff, and area media representatives on a tour of the project between Mountainburg and Fayetteville.

Though most of the route is not yet paved and the opening isn't scheduled for several more months, the group made its way up the new highway, through the Bobby Hopper Tunnel, and on to Springdale. Stops were made often along the journey to note key features such as the Hopper Tunnel and the Hess Creek Bridge, which,

at 210 feet, is the tallest structure along the route.

Construction on the route, which will be designated I-540 when complete, began in 1987. The portion from Alma to

Mountainburg opened to traffic in August 1995. The remainder of the 42-mile route is scheduled to open by January 1999. Total cost of the facility is expected to be nearly \$450 million.

Although Almond has been involved in many projects through the years, the most notable has been the Highway 71/Arkansas 540 project in Northwest Arkansas. "The challenges of that job sticks in my mind the most. Deep cuts, tall bridges and, of course, the tunnel offered a lot of obstacles that we had never faced before," he said.

A native of St. Charles, Almond currently resides in Bryant. He and his wife Jean have a daughter Rachel, a son David, and three grandchildren.

Nielsen and his wife Debbie are residents of Benton and have one daughter Katie.


## Scott Mullis Promoted To District 2 Construction Engineer

## AHTD and FHWA Team Up To Aid Local Youth

Six young people from the Little Rock area began work in early January as part of the Transportation Youth Corps Program sponsored by the Arkansas State Highway and Transportation Department (AHTD) and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). The program is designed to expose urban youth to a variety of job skills and activities.

of Little Rock which was severely damaged by a tornado March 1, 1997.


The program began in January with an orientation program at the Department, including a tour of AHTD facilities. After the orientation, the group began undertaking specific projects.

Work included wildlife enhancement efforts, opening a drainage channel at a Pine Bluff wetland mitigation site, and bagging trees for storage at the Department's on-site nursery. Other projects included working on transportation enhancement projects in North Little Rock and

Hot Springs. The workers also received training for obtaining a commercial driver's license and for non-commercial pesticide application along with basic first aid and CPR instruction.

The work was overseen by the AHTD's Environmental Division. The group also worked closely with College Station's Watershed, Inc., a non-profit organization that provided job counseling and other support for the participants.

AHTD and FHWA hope to continue the Transportation Youth Corp Program in the future.



## Comprehensive AHP Officer Training Results in Record Amount of Money and Drug Seizures

Officers from the Highway
Police Division of the Arkansas
State Highway and Transportation Department have made the
largest cash seizure by a nonfederal agency in the state's
history, according to Dan Flowers,
Director of the Arkansas State
Highway and Transportation
Department.

A total of \$3,166,199 was found Saturday, March 7, during a routine truck safety inspection

at the Lehi Weigh Station on Interstate 40 near West Memphis. Besides being the largest single seizure by a law enforcement agency ever in Arkansas, it is believed to be the fourth largest cash confiscation by a non-federal agency in the nation's history.

AHP Patrol Officer James Smith, assisted by Patrol Officer First Class Billy Brown, was performing a routine safety inspection on a large truck at approximately 8:00 p.m. when the money was found. The driver consented to a search of the cab after officers detected logbook and alcohol violations. The cash was found stored in four large suitcases in the sleeper portion of the cab. The driver, 41-year old Roberto V. Zamarripa of Harlingen, Texas, denied any knowledge of the suitcases or their contents.

The Crittenden County
Prosecuting Attorney's Office
assisted with the seizure following the discovery. The driver was
charged with misdemeanor
logbook and alcohol violations
along with felony money laundering counts. He is being detained
pending further investigation.

Highway Police officers also intercepted two large shipments of marijuana in early April. An early morning traffic stop along Interstate 30 near Hope on April 9 led to the discovery of 124 pounds of marijuana hidden in the gas tank of a pickup truck.

Officers Jack Stepp and
Daniel Morales searched the
chicle with their canines and
round the drugs. The two occu-

pants of the truck were charged with felony counts of possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver.

Officers also exposed a stash of drugs on April 10 at the Lehi Weigh Station along Interstate 40 where Pfc. Scott Fraley uncovered over 1,600 pounds of marijuana concealed in a load of watermelons. The tractor-trailer rig's two occupants were charged with felony counts of possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver.

"Aside from being highly proficient in vehicle inspections and commercial vehicle regulations, our officers are trained to look for signs of other criminal behavior," noted Highway Police Chief Ron Burks. "This is an example of that training paying off. We're very proud of our Highway Police officers and the results they are achieving."

AHP officers have been active in drug interdiction activities over the years. Other large drug-related seizures include the confiscation of 1,103 pounds of cocaine from a truck at the Lehi Weigh Station in 1992, and the discovery of 23,500 pounds of marijuana in a vehicle at the Hope Weigh Station.

In calendar year 1997, Highway Police officers confiscated nearly 4,700 pounds of marijuana and numerous smaller quantities of other illegal substances, as well as over \$61,000 in cash.

## Department Employees Recognized in FHWA National Photo Contest

Three AHTD employees were recently named winners in the Federal Highway Administration's (FHWA) fourth annual Photo Opportunity Competition. The contest is sponsored by the FHWA's *Greener Roadsides* quarterly newsletter.

John Jackson, of Public Affairs, and Rob Doster and Dwayne Stokes of the Environmental Division, each had winning photographs selected from among nearly 100 entries submitted nationally.

The newsletter sponsors an annual photo competition to support roadside programs that plant and protect wildflowers and other native vegetation. The FHWA believes good photography promotes and encourages this type of activity. Competition categories include


Native Wildflowers, Non-Native Wildflowers, Preserved Wildflowers, Public Awareness Efforts, Closeup, and Restoration and Management. The Department submitted six photos and placed in four categories.

John Jackson, Public Affairs Photographer, received a first-place award in the Non-Native Wildflowers category with his photograph of crimson clover taken along Highway 412 in Marion County. Jackson also won second place in the Preserved Wildflowers category with a photo of lanceleaf coreopsis taken on Highway 167 in Grant County.

Rob Doster, Environmental Analyst II, received second-place in the Closeup category with a picture of a pale purple cornflower he found along Highway 51 in Clark County.

Dwayne Stokes, Environmental Administrative Aide I, was named a third-place winner in the Public Awareness Efforts category with his photo of a section of Highway 4 in Bradley County. The seeds for the wildflowers planted along that highway were provided by the GFWCA Warren Women's Club through the Department's Wildflowers Program.

Aside from John Jackson's photo, other first-place winners were from Colorado, Missouri South Carolina and Utah. All fir place photographs will be featured in the Spring issue of *Greener Roadsides*.





# "Operation Blue-TALON" Arkansans Join A Regional Law Enforcement Initiative

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) Region VI invited law enforcement agencies in Arkansas to join forces with their neighbors in an effort to increase public awareness and enforcement of occupant protection laws during the two- week period of May 18-31.

The name of the initiative,
Operation Blue-TALON, represents
the six participants in the Region VI
area: (Blue - Bureau of Indian
Affairs, TALON - Texas, Arkansas,
Louisiana, Oklahoma and New
Mexico).

In preparation for Operation Blue-TALON, sixty-nine Arkansas law enforcement officers met in Little Rock April 14 to attend NHTSA's one-day Law Enforcement Summit on occupant protection issues. Chief Harry L. Crum, NHTSA Law Enforcement Liaison, asked officers to go "all out" during the period in enforcing occupant protection laws to increase safety belt and child safety seat usage rates and provide valuable information about the importance of occupant protection to the citizens they serve.



### "Buckle Up Arkansas Week" Proclaimed

## Everybody's Wearing Them

There was no shortage of safety-conscious individuals at the kick-off news conference for "Buckle Up Arkansas" week May 12 at the State Capitol. Members of the law enforcement and medical communities as well as representatives of state and national safety organizations were on hand.

AHTD Director Dan Flowers. who also serves as the Governor's Highway Safety Representative, served as master of ceremonies for the event, which featured a proclamation signing by Governor Mike Huckabee. Others on the program included Pulaski County Sheriff Randy Johnson, North Little Rock Police Chief William Nolan, Arkansas State Police Major Dan Oldham, Dr. Marvin Leibovich of the Pulaski County Medical Society, and Adele Derby, Associate Administrator for the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) in Washington.

The Governor proclaimed
May 18-25 as "Buckle Up Arkansas Week." "But I don't want this to be a one-week occurrence,"
Governor Huckabee told the crowd. "Buckling up has to become a 52-week per year commitment on the part of motorists."

The Governor cited statistics which show that by increasing seat belt usage from the current 48 percent to 63 percent in Arkansas, 47 fatalities and nearly 1,000 injuries could be prevented annually.

"The Highway Department administers approximately \$1.5 million annually in federal funds to promote safety," Flowers noted. "And research tells us that the best move a motorist can make to enhance safety is to buckle up and to make sure all passengers are buckled as well. That's why educational efforts like Buckle Up America are so important."

"Please don't take this per-

sonally," commented Dr. Leibovich to the crowd, "but I don't want your business." Dr.
Leibovich is head of the Emergency Department at Baptist
Medical Center in Little Rock.
"I don't want to meet you for the first time with you lying there in the ER looking up at me."

Adele Derby of NHTSA recognized three Arkansas trucking firms: J. B. Hunt Transport, Inc., ABF Freight System, and American Freightways, Inc., for their efforts in promoting safety. The Arkansas Motor Carriers Association was also recognized for their industry-wide support of the Buckle Up America campaign.

## Henderson State University Dedicates Pedestrian Overpass

Joining dignitaries from Southwest Arkansas, Arkansas Highway Commissioner John "M" Lipton helped dedicate the Henderson State University pedestrian overpass crossing Highway 7.

Funding for the project was approved by the Commission on May 26, 1995. Bids were opened at the Department on April 2, 1997. Shiloh Contractors of Shreveport, Louisiana was awarded the construction contract for the bridge. Total project cost

for the overpass was approximately \$660,000.

The project is one of almost 200 enhancement projects in the state approved for funding by the Commission with a total project cost of \$30 million. These projects help communities with unique needs such as beautification, historic preservation and, in the case of the overpass, pedestrian safety.

Connecting the main campus to Caplinger Airway Center near downtown Arkadelphia, the bridge improves safety for students crossing the highway. "We want to make sure that students are able to cross the highway in a safe and timely manner," Lipton said.

"This overpass is an outstanding example of how city, state and federal governments can work together in a cooperative arrangement – a partnership," he explained. "By working as partners, we were able to fund this project for those with a need to cross the highway."

The informal ceremony was held at the base of the bridge with Henderson State University President Dr. Charles Dunn introducing Mr. Lipton.

## Historic Train Depot Restored in North Little Rock

"ALL ABOARD!" Those were the words Mayor Patrick Hays used to kick off the grand reopening ceremony at the historic Rock Island Depot in North Little Rock May 12.

"The AHTD is pleased to have played a part in restoring this historic structure," commented Director Dan Flowers at the ceremony. "As a former Highway Department District Engineer for this area, I can appreciate the difference. This building has been transformed into a beautiful, functional building that will serve this town well for many years to come."

The Depot, which was built in 1913, had been abandoned since 1960 and had fallen into considerable disrepair. The City of North Little Rock applied for and received federal enhancement funds administered by the AHTD to restore the old building.

Construction began in late 1996 on the \$270,000 restoration project with enhancement funds paying for nearly \$190,000 of the total. The City of North Little Rock came up with the local match from several sources. Approximately 70 people, many of whom have lived in the neighborhood of the depot most of their lives, turned out for the event.

Restoration work included repair of the original brick walls, complete replacement of the roof structure, new windows and doors, and restoration of the original floor. Current plans call for the Sherman Park Community Development Corporation to have an office in the main room of the depot, occupying both the ticket master's office and the lobby.

## Southwest Hospital Hosts Health Fair at AHTD

Living a healthier life compelled several AHTD employees to venture to the Central Office Auditorium April 23 for the annual health fair, sponsored by Southwest Hospital.

Approximately 70 people took advantage of various types of health tests designed to examine the body's physical state. Tests included cholesterol/blood sugar, blood pressure, pulmonary function, height/weight, body fat, vision screening and colorectal screening kits.

If any signs of potential health problems were oticed, Southwest personnel referred employees to a doctor for further testing.

### Highway 65 Widening is Topic at Twin Groves

Approximately 40 people were on hand to review the proposed widening of Highway 65 near Twin Groves at a public hearing held March 10 at the Zion Grove Missionary Baptist Church in Twin Groves.

The majority of written comments received at the hearing favored the proposed project. Concerns voiced at the meeting centered on new access to citizens' property and relocation benefits.

The Highway Commission is planning a project to improve a 2.7-mile section of Highway 65 from just south of Damascus through Twin Groves. The proposed project generally consists of a four-lane highway with a portion of roadway being built on new location. Presently, Highway 65 consists of two 11- or 12-foot travel lanes with five- to eight-foot

shoulders. A new bridge over Batesville Creek will also be built with this project.

Twin Groves Mayor Richard Ealy was upbeat about the project. "We really need it bad. It's going to help the town and I think it is bringing us alive," he said. "In the long-range plan, I can see a quick mart and maybe a small motel opening here," Ealy added.

## Proposed Construction of New White River Bridge On Highway 64 Discussed at Augusta

Approximately 25 people viewed displays during a joint public hearing held by the AHTD and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in Augusta. The meeting held February 24 at the Au-

gusta Middle School dealt with the proposed construction of a new bridge on Highway 64 over the White River.

The new bridge will be located approximately 70 feet south of the

existing bridge. Project length for the structure and its approaches will be approximately 1.6 miles and will consist of 1.4 miles of four-lane roadway with a 3,155-foot long bridge. The cross-section of the roadway includes four 12-foot travel lanes with eight-foot shoulders.

The Missouri Valley Bridge and Iron Works of Leavenworth, Kansas built the existing structure in 1930. It is just over 3,000 feet long and is considered functionally obsolete for the level of service at the bridge.

The average daily traffic count for the highway is 5,400 vehicles with that number expected to increase to 8,000 vehicles per day by the year 2017. Eighteen percent of the traffic in this segment of highway is trucks.

### Highway 63 Widening is Discussed at Bono

The proposed widening of Highway 63 between Bono and Jonesboro brought out a large crowd to the Bono Volunteer Fire Station June 2. Over 125 people crowded the station to view displays of the project.

The 2.5-mile stretch of Highway 63 to be improved includes widening the existing roadway to four 12-foot travel lanes with a six-foot painted median between the two cities. The existing roadway consists of two 12-foot travel lanes with eight-foot shoulders. The route is projected to carry over 30,000 vehicles per day by the year 2018 - up from 15,600 at the present. Most citizens on hand for the openforum public hearing were satisfied with the plans for the project.

Craighead County Judge Roy Bearden seemed especially pleased. "This is something we've needed for a long time. They (AHTD) can't start soon enough to suit me," he added. Bids on the approximately \$6 million project could be opened later this year or early 1999. The project should take approximately two years to complete.




